I attended the first meeting of our new Business Retention and Development Committee this morning which again reminded me of what a talented group of residents live in Louisville. What makes Louisville such a great place to live is an ineffable quality -- sure it has to do with open space and trails, the historic downtown, great community events and great schools -- but I think it really comes down to the people who live here. People who have such a strong community spirit, give of their time and talent, help less fortunate members of the community and join in all the activities the City has to offer. And there is a lot to offer. The downtown patios are out, the Taste of Louisville is on June 3rd, the Street Faire opens on June 9th with Roomful of Blues, then there are Concerts in the Park, the 4th of July festivities, and lots more. I hope to see you all at an event or several. Also don't forget, you can join me to chat at the museum or on an open space walk, on Saturday mornings at 9-10 am on alternate months. Check the City calendar for the schedule.

You've no doubt heard by now that our City Manager Malcolm Fleming will be moving on to new opportunities. In April Malcolm and the City Council mutually agreed to part ways after Malcolm's 10 years of service to the community. He will work until the middle of July to help us transition with all the things we have underway in town. We have already started the water and sewer line replacement and concrete work scheduled for this summer. Soon we will begin street repaving and reconstruction as part of our aggressive plan of street maintenance we began a few years ago. We are in the final design phase of the new Recreation/Senior Center improvements and upgrades at Memory Square Pool. We are working on completing the new South Street Gateway, so you'll be able to park in our new lot east of the tracks and walk through the underpass to downtown. We are designing an underpass beneath 95th Street between North End and Steele Ranch to build next year, and beginning design of an underpass in Steele Ranch under the railroad tracks which will complete the "Lake to Lake" trail from Waneka Lake to Harper Lake. All of this is a huge amount of work for City staff, and I appreciate Malcolm staying to keep things on track. When he leaves, Deputy City Manager Heather Balser will assume his duties and we know she will provide a steady hand as Interim City Manager. The City Council will discuss the process of hiring a new City Manager in the coming weeks.

I want to personally thank Malcolm for all the things he has done for the City over these 10 years. I have appreciated his calm and thoughtful demeanor. It's been an honor for me to have had the chance to work with him on behalf of the City. He has overseen many large projects -- our new City Services facility, the McCaslin underpass, the acquisition of the addition to Cottonwood Park, and the redevelopment of the empty Safeway into the new Alfas center -- to name but a few. But he also improved our long term economic forecasting which has improved our budgeting process and has hired a very talented staff of great men and women who work hard everyday to make Louisville such a great town for all of us. I wish him fair winds and following seas wherever life takes him next.

MALCOLM FLEMING LEAVING CITY MANAGER POSITION AFTER 10 YEARS



City Manager Malcolm Fleming will depart his position as Louisville's top administrator in July 2017. During his tenure as City Manager, Mr. Fleming provided key leadership overseeing many City initiatives, during a period when the City was consistently ranked as one of the best communities to live in America. Mr. Fleming not only provided valuable guidance to the City's employees but also managed millions of dollars of major capital projects and helped to strengthen the local economy and City's finances. Some of Mr. Fleming's noteworthy accomplishments include: reconstruction of the US 36/McCaslin Interchange, flood recovery efforts from the 2013 flood, construction of the South Street downtown pedestrian gateway, implementing the downtown patio program and other business incentives, transitioning from an annual to a biennial budget process, and renovating and expanding the Louisville Recreation/Senior Center and Memory Square Pool. Deputy City Manager Heather Balser will assume Mr. Fleming's duties upon his departure and the City Council will begin the process for recruitment of a new City Manager.

SUMMER CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

Multiple large capital improvement projects are scheduled in Downtown and Old Town in the next few months. City staff asks for your understanding during construction and reminds everyone to exercise caution when driving, biking, or walking through construction zones.

- South Street Underpass - The South Street Underpass is underway. Work includes utility, concrete, and plaza construction. Construction will impact the adjacent area for the remainder of 2017.
- Redevelopment East of Railroad - The DELO and DELO Plaza projects east of the railroad between Griffith Street and South Street are moving forward. Work includes street, stormwater, and waterline construction to serve this new neighborhood. This work will impact the adjacent area for the remainder of 2017.
- Street Resurfacing - Multiple roads in town will be resurfaced this summer. Concrete work needed prior to resurfacing has been scheduled. Streets to be resurfaced include: Centennial Parkway (Via Appia to Cherry Street), Dillon Road (W. Dahlia Street to Club Circle), Nighthawk Circle, Grant Avenue (Pine Street to Hutchinson Street), Grant Avenue (Caledonia Street to South Street), Jefferson Avenue (Short Street to South Street), and Front Street (Rex Street to Alley).
- Water & Sewer Line Replacement - Water and sewer lines will be replaced throughout the City this summer and fall. Visit the Construction Updates page on the City's website at www.LouisvilleCO.Gov/Construction to learn more.

SOLID WASTE & HAZARDOUS MATERIALS FEE INCREASES

On May 2nd, City Council approved rate increases for the City's Solid Waste Administrative Fee and Hazardous Materials Facility Fee. These increases will become effective June 1, 2017. The Administrative Fee will increase from \$1.55 to \$2.35 per month to fund management and billing costs associated with the City's solid waste, recycling, and composting collection programs. This increase is a result of the City's implementation of program budgeting in 2016. Program budgeting more accurately accounts for and allocates costs to various activities within the City.

The Hazardous Materials Management Facility Fee (HMMF) will increase from \$0.50 to \$0.55. This increase reflects small increases in ongoing operational costs. The HMMF is a partnership among Boulder County communities that provides for a safe location to dispose of and repurpose hazardous materials such as fuel, paint, fertilizer, batteries, and other household items. SAUNDERS JOINS RECREATION FACILITIES EXPANSION TEAM

The recreation facilities expansion project team continues to focus on design development. City Council approved Saunders Construction as the Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) for the project. Saunders has significant experience on similar projects in Colorado and around the country. Adding Saunders to the team now means we can better identify cost savings measures without sacrificing quality, get more accurate cost estimates, and get the project ready to break ground! Some of the thousands of project details the team is working through include life cycle cost analysis for sustainability and cell tower design options. Staff also met with the Parks and Public Landscaping and Open Space Advisory Boards to keep members up-to-date on the project. The team recently held a public presentation to update residents on the status of the project and timeline on May 4th. Keep an eye out for future meetings! HERBICIDE USE IN PARKS AND PLAYGROUNDS

Spring is upon us! This means that flowers and trees are blooming, grass is growing, and yes, those pesky weeds have also appeared. One of the tools the City uses to control weeds is herbicides. Questions and concerns commonly arise with the use of herbicides and rightfully so. In order to better explain the City's use of herbicides and answer questions that residents may have, the City has put together a Weed Management and Herbicide Guide, which can be found at www.LouisvilleCO.Gov/Parks.

You may also be wondering when the City will apply broadleaf herbicides. City staff normally applies broadleaf herbicides in the spring. Before an application can occur, on-site notifications will be posted. Additionally, you can sign up for e-notifications at www.LouisvilleCO.Gov/Enotification. When you sign up, you should start to receive emails from the City with the upcoming week's broadleaf application schedule.

Lastly, have you noticed any new signs at your favorite park playgrounds? Starting this year, the City will no longer apply herbicides in playgrounds! This pilot program has been endorsed by the City's Parks and Public Landscape Advisory Board with the intent of eliminating any possible chance of public exposure to herbicides in these highly used areas. Following the recent adoption of the Small Area Plans for South Boulder Road and McCaslin Boulevard, the City will begin the process of updating the Design Guidelines and Sign Regulations later this summer. Did you know that Louisville has a unique voluntary preservation program, supported by a dedicated sales tax? The program recognizes the significance of more than 35 local landmarks and honors the links to the community's history that these properties represent. This fund is used for projects in Downtown and Old Town, residential and commercial grants for landmarked properties, new construction grants for additions or separate structures on landmarked commercial properties, historic structure assessments, acquisition of historic properties, special projects and public outreach, and administration. BUSINESS RETENTION & DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

The BRaD Committee is a City Council committee comprised of three City Council members and representatives from the Chamber of Commerce, the Downtown Business Association, the Colorado Tech Center, the Revitalization Commission, and the Planning Commission. It meets the first Monday of each month in the Library meeting room, 951 Spruce Street, at 8:00 AM.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

The City Council Finance Committee is comprised of the Mayor and two City Council members. The members meet with staff to discuss financial matters the third Monday of every month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 7:30 AM.

BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Board of Adjustment is a quasi-judicial board that hears and decides requests for variances from the City’s zoning ordinances. The Board meets the third Wednesday of each month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 6:30 PM, only as needed.

BUILDING CODE BOARD OF APPEALS

The Board of Appeals hears and decides appeals of orders, decisions, or determinations made by building officials relative to the application of the building code. The Board meets the third Thursday of each month at the City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 6:30 PM, only as needed.

CULTURAL COUNCIL

The Cultural Council produces cultural activities and works to advance and preserve the arts in Louisville. The Council meets the third Thursday of each month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 6:30 PM.

GOLF COURSE ADVISORY BOARD

The GCAB advises the City on matters related to the Coal Creek Golf Course and its management. The Board meets the third Monday of each month at the Library Meeting Room, 951 Spruce Street, at 6:30 PM.

HISTORIC PRESERVATION COMMISSION

The Historic Preservation Commission advises the City on preservation issues and use of the Historic Preservation Fund, and oversees the designation of properties as local landmarks. The Commission meets the third Monday of each month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 6:30 PM.

HISTORICAL COMMISSION

The Historical Commission promotes public awareness of the history of Louisville, with an emphasis on the coal mining era, and advises the Louisville Historical Museum. The Commission meets the first Wednesday of odd-numbered months at Library Meeting Room, 951 Spruce Street, at 6:30 PM.

LIBRARY BOARD OF TRUSTEES

The Library Board of Trustees advisory body that gives advice to the City Council about local policy. The Board meets the second Thursday of odd-numbered months at the Library, 951 Spruce Street, at 6:30 PM.

LOCAL LICENSING AUTHORITY

The Licensing Authority reviews applications for liquor and marijuana licenses and reviews alleged violations of state and local liquor and marijuana codes. The Authority meets the fourth Monday of each month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 7:00 PM.

OPEN SPACE ADVISORY BOARD

The Open Space Advisory Board advises the City Council on the management of Open Space properties. The Board meets the second Wednesday of each month at the Library, 951 Spruce Street, at 7:00 PM.

PARKS & PUBLIC LANDSCAPING ADVISORY BOARD

The Parks & Public Landscaping Board advises the City on parks, park programs, and facilities. It also advises on long-term planning and best practices for maintenance. The board advises the City on the development and implementation of public landscape projects and supports healthy horticulture practices through public education. The Board meets the first Thursday of each month at the City Services Center, 739 104th Street, at 7:00 PM.

PLANNING COMMISSION

The Planning Commission evaluates land use proposals, holds public hearings to evaluate each proposal against municipal ordinances and zoning regulations, and makes recommendations to the City Council. The Commission meets the second Thursday of each month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 6:30 PM.

REVITALIZATION COMMISSION

The Revitalization Commission is responsible for conducting urban revitalization activities throughout the City and particularly in the Highway 42 Revitalization Area. The Commission meets the second Monday of each month at the Library, 951 Spruce Street, at 7:30 AM.

SUSTAINABILITY ADVISORY BOARD

The Sustainability Advisory Board identifies opportunities for resource conservation and energy efficiency in the City and advises City Council on approaches to conservation and sustainability. The Board meets the third Wednesday of each month at City Hall, 749 Main Street, at 6:30 PM.

YOUTH ADVISORY BOARD

The Youth Advisory Board advises the City on issues affecting the youth of Louisville. The Board consists of students from grades 6-12 in Louisville and meets the first Thursday of each month during the school year at the Recreation Center, 900 West Via Appia, at 6:30 PM.
